## Easter Offering

### Feeding the Hungry

This year the Outreach Council has chosen the theme "Feeding the Hungry" for our annual Easter offering. Recently, world food prices hit an all-time high. While visiting with our friends in Nicaragua, we found out that rice and bean prices there had almost doubled in the last year. For families living on a few dollars a day, this increase is devastating. Much of the unrest around the world is related to increased food prices.



Here at home, our local food kitchens and pantries have experienced large increases in the number of people seeking food assistance. Micah Ministries served over 35,000 hot plates of food in 2010. Cross-Lines Community Outreach distributes over 1 million pounds of food a year.

Half of our Easter offering will go to help local feeding programs, and half will go to our partners in Nicaragua. **Locally**, our offering will go to Cross-Lines Community Outreach food kitchen, Harvesters Community Food Network and Micah Ministries.



**Internationally**, our offering will allow our mission partner CEPAD, the Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua.

Most of us don't have to worry about our next meal. For many others it is a constant concern.



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# Church Launches Capital Campaign

## Feasibility Report Reveals Positive Support for Campaign

Over 210 church households were represented in the recent Capital Campaign feasibility study. The study revealed members are very satisfied with how Country Club Christian Church is providing members spiritual formation and opportunities for fellowship. Members also expressed a high level of confidence in the ministers, staff and lay leadership of the church.

Nearly 80 percent believe that the church should go forward with a capital campaign at this time. Priorities among the list of projects include those that are critical to securing the exterior structure of the church. Several other projects also captured support from the members including stained glass window covers, water line under the street and organ. Over 85 percent said they would support a three-year campaign financially.

### One Campaign – Two Appeals

This is our appeal to our members to make a 12-month commitment to support the operating budget, which includes staffing, programs, utilities and day-to-day maintenance on our buildings.

The second commitment is to the Capital Campaign. This is a three-year financial commitment that will pay for larger capital improvements.

Over the next couple of months, members will have opportunities to learn more about both appeals through newsletters, small group meetings and our church website.

## Don't Look Down

Several years ago on a youth group ski trip I got talked into skiing the black diamond slopes. I was a decent intermediate level skier and I had tried a few black diamond slopes but this was a double black diamond (a ski resort sign for “You are going to die”). Four guys in my group got me up there. Three of them laughed as they took off and said, “If you live we’ll see you at the bottom.” The fourth stood by and said, “Just stay focused on your form and you’ll do fine. If you look down you’re gonna freak at how steep this is. Oh, and by the way, there are moguls, too.

Just keep doing what you know and you’ll be fine. Don’t ever lose focus or you will die.” With that less than helpful comment he took off. I am sure that I still hold the record for the slowest decent on that double black diamond ever but one thing is clear, I kept my focus—fear of death will do that—and I did not fall one time.

The gospel writers ask us to stay focused, too. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John want us to pay serious attention to the life and teaching of Jesus.

Sometimes we have a tendency to look only at the life and person of Jesus. There is nothing wrong with examining his life; it can be very inspirational for our faith. Jesus’ prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night before his crucifixion, “Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me,” reminds us that openness and honesty are the best ways to pray.

The gospel writers know, however, that we cannot separate the life and the teaching of Jesus. His life is reflective of his teaching. They are rhetorically asking, “Do you see how Jesus is living and who Jesus is with? Are you ready to do that, too? Are you ready to knock down the barriers that divide and open yourself up to a new way of thinking?”

For the season of Lent I have been focused on Jesus’ teaching in the Sermon on the Mount: “In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets.” I’ve begun each day during this season reading and meditating on this text. I have tried to make it my focus. I have found at the end of the day that it is a very hard teaching to follow (it makes skiing the double black diamond look easy). I have lost focus and fallen a few times but I have also found that the longer I focus on this teaching the less inclined I am to take myself too seriously and the more inclined I am to see the needs of the world all around.

## Why I Am Hopeful

I have responsibilities at my seminary from about 8:00 a.m to 6:00 p.m. and then I have to rush over to the church so that I can lead the Pastors' Class for our 6th graders from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. By the end of Wednesday I should be exhausted. But when all is said and done, I am smiling from ear to ear and full of energy. The energy and smile come from working with our youth; they fill me with so much hope.

The hope of Pastors' Class is that our young people explore their faith, question it, and claim it as their own. They do so under the guidance of Rev. Catherine Stark-Corn and myself. On Palm Sunday we will celebrate this exploration and questioning by participating in the ritual of baptism and joining the church. What has filled me with hope is being able to participate in their questioning and in their claiming of their own faith.

Every Wednesday I learn what it means to come to a table with people and be honest, and open. I learn what it means to struggle and celebrate. I feel as though this is what discipleship is about. Discipleship is humbly, openly and passionately seeking ways to live that reflect God's love. Our Pastors' Class has shown me true discipleship. This is why after a long day I am still smiling.

This Palm Sunday, Apr. 17, at the 11:00 a.m. worship service, you will have the opportunity to see the 6th graders celebrate their faith. This could mean that they get baptized, they celebrate a previous baptism, or they simply stand up and say that they want to join the church. On that Sunday you will have the chance to see some of my mentors of faith step into the waters of baptism and join our church. I hope that in being a part of their special day you will see the hope for the world and the Church that I have seen in the past few weeks.

## Method Acting

I've been thinking about seasons lately—both as warm weather returns and because of Lent. What I'm most compelled with, is how our communal life as a church is divided into seasons. I think part of the reason the church has seasons (like Lent, Advent, Easter, etc.) is a reflection of what Ecclesiastes—or The Byrds—meant by, “for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under Heaven.” We need different church seasons to express all the emotions with which life blesses us.

To learn how to engage these seasonal emotions more fully, I think we could learn from method acting. It calls for actors to move and speak out of their emotional memories to give a reality to the character they inhabit—more re-acting than acting. This may seem obvious, but it can be quite difficult to engage those emotional memories while keeping within the parameters of the script.

We are actors in the midst of a script called Lent. Let's rely on our connections to our emotional memories about mortality, uncertainty and fear for what it means to follow Jesus to Jerusalem. These memories come not only from our lives, but scripture and history of the church universal. While this is a big a task, it allows us flexibility to let each season be fluid. Your thoughts, actions and feelings about Lenten issues will be different this year than next—and that is good! We're freed from feeling like we're not experiencing the “right” thing. As long as we're pulling from our emotional memories, we're being true to the script.

The Emo-rock band Bright Eyes has a song called “Method Acting” that speaks to that authenticity that I pray we all experience this Lent. May these lyrics meet you where you are:

*I don't know what tomorrow brings.  
It is alive with such possibilities.  
All I know is I feel better when I sing.  
Burdens are lifted from me, that's my voice rising!  
...  
We have a problem with no solution but to love and to be loved.  
So, I've made peace with the falling leaves.  
I see their same fate in my own body.  
But I won't be frightened when I am awoken from this dream  
and returned to that which gave birth to me.  
And the story goes on and on and on and on...*


### We Need Books! Books! Books!
