## Easter Offering: Feeding the Hungry

This year the Outreach Council has chosen the theme “Feeding the Hungry” for our annual Easter offering. Recently, world food prices hit an all-time high. While visiting with our friends in Nicaragua, we found out that rice and bean prices there had almost doubled in the last year. For families living on a few dollars a day, this increase is devastating. Much of the unrest around the world is related to increased food prices.

Here at home, our local food kitchens and pantries have experienced large increases in the number of people seeking food assistance. Micah Ministries served over 35,000 hot

plates of food in 2010. Cross-Lines Community Outreach distributes over 1 million pounds of food a year.

Half of our Easter offering will go to help local feeding programs, and half will go to our partners in Nicaragua. **Locally**, our offering will go to Cross-Lines Community Outreach food kitchen, Harvesters Community Food Network and Micah Ministries.

**Internationally**, our offering will allow our mission partner CEPAD, the Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua. Most of us don't have to worry about our next meal. For many others it is a constant concern. Please give generously.

### One Campaign with Two Appeals

After reviewing the very positive report from our recent capital campaign feasibility study, our Congregational Board elected to go forward with our campaign to update and repair our aging facilities and possibly fund a new outreach effort. On June 12, members will be asked to make two commitments to the same campaign. One commitment is to the annual stewardship drive. This is our appeal to our members to make a 12-month commitment to support the operating budget, which includes staffing, programs, utilities and day-to-day maintenance on our buildings. The second commitment is to our Capital Campaign. This is a three-year financial commitment that will pay for larger capital improvements. ## Love Made Real

Do you remember the Kevin Costner movie, “Robin Hood, The Prince of Thieves?” It is a popcorn film, pure fluff, but fun. At the end, after Robin has once again saved everyone from the evil Sheriff of Nottingham, a guest comes riding triumphantly into their entourage. It is, of course, King Richard, played by Sean Connery. He is sitting on a strong and beautiful white horse. He is decked out in full king regalia. He looks great. I remember seeing the film in the theater with my wife. I recall her words as James Bond, I mean, King Richard, rode into the

scene: “Sean Connery is the most handsome man in the world.” I think I may have accidentally spilled my diet soda on her.

That is exactly what we want on Palm Sunday. We want big and strong and handsome and maybe even just the hint of an English accent so that Jesus sounds royal and regal enough for the part. It is not hard to think to ourselves, “Yeah, we know Good Friday is coming but we Christians will get the better of everyone else by next week. We will be in charge and in command by then.” I am amazed at how quickly and how easily I can sink into such thinking.

To think that way is to miss the point not only of Palm Sunday but also the reason for the ministry of Jesus Christ and the very heart of our faith. We need to ask ourselves which Jesus do we want to follow? The one who came to the world in the name of love or the one we construct and mold to fit our own private needs?

What the Gospel writers want us to see and what God wants us to finally understand is that love is more than strong enough to carry us forward in faith. Love itself is the greatest power the world has ever seen, then, now or tomorrow. Love is the motivating factor behind Jesus’ willingness to go to Jerusalem, to face the cross. The world may have wanted a miracle but Jesus did not come to put on a show, he came to help us love one another.

I am convinced that the world does not need more miracles. The world does not need to see great acts of heavenly power. I long for that to happen but the fact is the wonder and the awe eventually fade. Tony Campolo has really helped me on this. He says “I believe the world is more hungry to see the love of God expressed in us and through us than it is to be dazzled by miracles that show off God’s power.”

The love of God expressed in us may be the most miraculous thing the world has ever seen.

## Celebrate

*Until further notice, celebrate everything.*

This was one of the last posts my friend Todd left on his Facebook profile before he was killed in a motorcycle accident on Mar. 31. Known for his bigger-than-life personality, Todd was a beloved fixture in my hometown of Macon, MO. Born and raised there, he'd traveled the world and gotten both an academic education and the kind of learning one can only gain by experience. Then he returned to Macon to be close to his family, work at the nearby university, and raise his son. He

helped run his mom's bed and breakfast, he starred in community theatre productions, he was active in local politics, he rode with the Patriot Guard, he was running for school board.

To know Todd was to love him. And as I sat with the nearly 500 other mourners at the church on the day of his funeral, I heard so many describe him as someone whose zest for life was immeasurable. He didn't know a stranger, he remembered people's names, he smiled and laughed and hugged people with abandon. He seemed to love everyone he ever met.

The loss of such a friend is heavy, dark and thick. But as I struggle with the waves of grief, I keep forcing myself back to that last Facebook post: *Until further notice, celebrate everything.*

As we move into Holy Week, I'm thinking about how we celebrate the miracle of Easter. The festive nature of Palm Sunday makes it easy at first, with the children singing and the palm branches waving. But by Good Friday I will find myself back in the darkness, struggling for air. And even as Easter morning arrives and we celebrate the resurrection, I admit I still feel a bit hollow. Jesus is risen, the hallelujahs are proclaimed, new life awaits us all. But amidst the celebration, I can't forget that ultimately Jesus' friends must move forward, go on without him at their sides.

And that's what they do. They celebrate by moving forward, by going on to live the values and ideals Jesus taught them. They honor him, even in their grief, by trying to live as he did, by sharing his love.

Perhaps Jesus' friends might have found comfort in these words from my favorite Walt Whitman poem. In fact, perhaps it's also one of the lessons we find in the resurrection: *"All goes onward and outward. . . and nothing collapses, And to die is different from what any one supposed, and luckier."*

So from now on, at least until further notice, I'm going to try to celebrate everything.

## Table for Twelve

This time in the church year always rekindles memories from younger years lived out in one Presbyterian church. I can hear the singing of a hosanna song as we paraded around the church and through the church in celebration of Palm Sunday. I recall my mother making sure we understood our new clothes we would wear on Easter were new *spring clothes* not Easter clothes, since this was an inappropriate way of celebrating Easter in her mind.

A chill in the early morning reminds me of Easter sunrise services full of a winter nip in the air more often than sun-filled spring mornings.

One of my strongest memories about Holy Week observances was the way we celebrated Maundy Thursday. Seeking to emulate the last supper Jesus celebrated with the disciples, we would gather in the fellowship hall around long tables in groups of 12. I can see the room setup: mostly lit by candle-light; tables and chairs to welcome about 200 of Jesus' followers; the aroma of freshly baked bread hanging in the air. Even in such an open setting, with a fairly large group there was a deep intimacy as we sat shoulder to shoulder and heard about Jesus' last meal with the disciples. Being across from one another we would catch each other's eyes – too stiffened by the somberness of the occasion to share a full smile, yet deeply connected by this shared act.

Sitting at these tables we were just rag tag groups of people much like Jesus' collection of disciples. Sitting in groups of 12 we were all equals, we all came as children of God. It did not matter what your day had been like, working as a president of a bank or pushing a mop to clean a hospital floor. In those moments we were all one seeking to know and feel the depths of God's love for each of us.

Too often we set conditions for who can come to commune with God. Not on those Maundy Thursday nights – all were welcomed, all had a place, all were kindred souls in those moments.

As we enter Holy Week we leave the shouts of hosanna of Palm Sunday, moving into the events that lead to the crucifixion of Christ. I pray that we all find a place at the table, that we all know God has a place for each of us at the table. May each of us find ways to commune with God and one another as we journey towards the mystery of Easter and the promise of new life.


