Mr. Salwen spent 18 years writing and editing at the Wall Street Journal, then left to create his own company in 2000 and has been an entrepreneur ever since.

He was living with his wife and two teenagers in Atlanta when his 14-year-old daughter, Hannah, noticed a homeless man sitting next to a Mercedes. She said, "You know Dad, if that man had a less nice car, that man there could have a meal." What followed was the family decision to sell their house and give half of the proceeds to charitable causes in which they deeply believed.

Along the way, the Salwens tried to figure out how much was the right amount to give to charity, both in time and money. The Half project also transformed the Salwen family, heightening

their trust in one another, empowering the kids, building a deeper connection.

The three-part Pathways to Learning on "Money: Faithful Approaches" also includes a presentation on Sun., Nov. 7 by Chris Lester, Senior Vice President/Business Growth for the Greater Kansas City Chamber of Commerce, and on Sun., Nov. 14 by Dr. Todd Adams, Associate General Minister and Vice President of Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Looking for Jesus

Young adults are asking about Jesus. They are studying what he taught and what he preached. In a world filled with war and violence and poverty and economic uncertainty and more they want to know if Jesus and the church have anything to say to that world.

For a long time the church has emphasized believing certain things about Jesus. Now the emphasis is shifting. More and more people want to know, "What did Jesus teach and preach?"

Theologian H. Richard Niebuhr said, "The great Christian revolutions come not by the discovery of something that was not known before. They happen when somebody takes radically something that was always there."

This desire to learn more about Jesus' teachings has come about because many young adults see Christianity as a failed religion. Evangelical pastor Brian McLaren writes that they see a Christianity that "has focused on 'me' and 'my soul' and 'my spiritual life' and 'my eternal destiny' but it has failed to address the dominant societal and global realities of their lifetime: systemic injustice, systemic poverty, systemic ecological crisis, systemic dysfunctions of many kinds."

Perhaps the place to begin is the one and only "commandment" Jesus gave to the church. What was the commandment? Was it about right thinking? No. Was it about correct doctrine? No. Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. All will know that you are my disciples if you love one another."

Evangelist Brennan Manning, commenting on that commandment, gives this instruction to the church, "We would be known as his followers not because we are chaste, celibate, honest, sober, or respectable; not because we are church-going, Bible-toting, Psalm-singing: We would be recognized as disciples primarily by our deep and delicate respect for one another."

Perhaps our ability to love one another begins with the ability to see that we are loved, as we are, by God. Perhaps our ability to honestly and openly face the world's issues and the great concerns that surround us begins with our own ability and desire to love one another.

As John wrote in his letter to the church 2000 years ago: "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love."

Christmas Is Coming

Christmas is coming! Yes, it is hard to believe but rehearsals and planning are well under way to get ready for the myriad events that we offer during the Advent season. I don't know about you, but I am already beginning to feel the stress of that holiday period: deadlines to be met; anthems to fine tune; instrumentalists to schedule. And that does not take into consideration the day-to-day work that must be done both here and at home.

Just the other day I spoke with a parishioner who expressed the same angst about what lay ahead in

terms of both home and her work place. Several weeks ago I had another conversation with a friend about once again needing to categorize our lists between that which is "urgent" and that which is "important." In setting these priorities, I've noticed that items I've marked "urgent" have a way of being completed and erased, while those that are "important" remain with me.

Personally, I have found that the things that I do that truly have lasting importance center on people (their needs and as well as my own): our musical organizations; family and friends; the church. These are the things that fall into that "important" column.

I am reminded of a warm up exercise I used in my rehearsals. I asked the singers to close their eyes and, breathing through the nose, imagine the odor of fragrant roses. This not only improves breath support, but it also eases some of the stress that everyone carries with them each day.

We all are about to enter a truly "urgent" time of the year. If you personally are finding it necessary to prioritize the events in your life, try this. First, determine what is important vs. urgent. Then, close your eyes, inhale through your nose, and smell the fragrant roses.
