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

Author Kevin Salwen to Speak on November 10

Kevin Salwen, coauthor with his daughter of *The Power of Half: One Family's Decision to Stop Taking and Start Giving Back*, will speak on Wed., Nov. 10 as part of the Pathways to Learning on "Money: Faithful Approaches."



A reception in the parlor at 6:00 p.m. will precede the talk. Following Mr. Salwen's presentation, a book signing is planned in the Social Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

Mr. Salwen spent 18 years writing and editing at the *Wall Street Journal*, then left to create his own company in 2000 and has been an entrepreneur ever since.

He was living with his wife and two teenagers in Atlanta when his 14-year-old daughter, Hannah, noticed a homeless man sitting next to a Mercedes. She said, "You know Dad, if that man had a less nice car, that man there could have a meal." What followed was the family decision to sell their house and give half of the proceeds to charitable causes in which they deeply believed.

The Half project also transformed the Salwen family, heightening their trust in one another, empowering the kids, building a deeper connection.

Sacred Conversations

Although it's been many months since the church participated in Sacred Conversations, periodically someone asks, "When are we ever going to learn the results of Sacred Conversations?" In some ways, the results are known, for over the last 18 months, hundreds of us participated in one of many small groups. We met new persons, reconnected with friends, and openly shared hopes, experiences, dreams, and concerns. In this respect, we already know one of the Sacred Conversation results – we experienced community.

However, most likely when someone asks about the results, he/she is wondering when the congregation will learn the responses. My initial thought was to put a copy of the compiled responses – 74 legal-sized pages – in the library for anyone to read. However, some of the responses are so personal that it might be possible to guess the person's identity. Because participants were not told their comments would be shared with the entire church, it would feel like a breach of confidence to place the responses in the library.

In reviewing the responses, the Visioning Committee learned that through every activity the church does, there are opportunities to experience community, awe, and the presence of God. This feeling was often experienced outside the church as well, in a bridge group, book club, golf foursome, an Army unit in Iraq, a theater group, a study group in law school, a Pacific beach during World War II.

However, some of the church activities that are meaningful to many are not helpful to others. As an example, several stated they feel community visiting in the parlor after church, yet one or two persons indicated this is a time when they feel excluded. Several persons mentioned they experience God's presence in the serving of communion, while another person found it uncomfortable to serve. One person stated community occurs "when I see God in new ways." Another person appreciated Justin Ziegler's children's sermon, when he told the children that "God's love is like the water around my pet goldfish." Some persons feel a lack of community within our church because: there is no college-age Sunday School class; when they feel judged at church; the church puts too many demands on them; persons are afraid to let others know when they're struggling; and they've not been elected to the Congregational Board.

At-One-Ment

Joseph Campbell says that “Jesus’ death on the cross was not as ransom paid, or as a penalty applied, but an act of atonement, at-one-ment with the human race.” What the church saw in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus was one like God who entered into our sufferings and our joys, our heavens and our hells.

The cross that stands before us in our sanctuary is an invitation to live and love within the light of God’s grace. It is an invitation to you and to me to give ourselves away to the world in the name of Jesus Christ not to save them from eternal punishment but to invite them to live today within the love that God has already given to every being on the face of this planet.

Why we do we shy away from sharing this message? Are we afraid that grace makes life too easy? Why have we failed to preach this word to the world? Ask a random group of folks on the street what they think about Christians and the all too common answer will be “judgmental.”

Philip Yancey writes about a friend of his, a woman, who was standing in the sanctuary of her church with her 15-year-old daughter. The pastor’s wife approached Yancey’s friend and said, “I hear you are divorcing. What I can’t understand is that if you love Jesus, why are you doing that?” The pastor’s wife had never really spoken to this woman before. Her mean-spirited little lecture stunned the divorcing woman into silence. Later the woman said, “The pain of it was that my husband and I both really did love Jesus, but the marriage was broken beyond mending. If she had just put her arms around me and said, ‘I’m so sorry...’ ”

Why do so many who claim to follow Jesus live in a spirit of judgmentalism and fear? As I said in the sermon last Sunday, not once in the scriptures do we find Jesus specifically naming anyone a “sinner.” Instead, over and over again, we see Jesus reaching out to the lost, the least, the little, the last and the dead.

All we have to do to get a clear reminder of God’s great love as revealed in Jesus is look at the cross. What request does the thief on the cross next to Jesus make? “Remember me.” That’s it. Jesus’ shocking reply is “Today you will be in paradise.”

Jesus’ life and teaching invite us to leave fear behind so that we might live in the love of God.

Staff Organization Study

At the request of the Personnel Committee and with funding from Endowment, the Alban Institute will soon begin an evaluation of the current organization of our support staff.

With Sandy Eisenman's departure, the church has an important opportunity to evaluate the position of Director of Financial Services and determine how that position should be structured going forward. In addition, because a management study of the church has not been done since 1992, now is a good opportunity to take an overall look at other administrative functions to determine the most efficient and effective way for the support staff to provide their services.

The Alban Institute, one of the premier consulting firms for churches, will provide an objective assessment of our current staffing organization, make recommendations, and provide options for restructuring the current staff. The focus will be on adequately defining staff roles, authority, responsibility and accountability. The purpose is not to eliminate positions, but rather to find if we could more efficiently and effectively serve our members, care for our building and provide outreach to our community and elsewhere. While we do not have a specific timetable, we hope that the consultant can complete the study and make recommendations before the first of December.

Where they volunteer: Kansas City Free Health Clinic



How long: Six years

Why they decided to get involved: We decided to volunteer there as Cindy is an RN and her skills are highly needed as the volunteer physicians want to have RNs with them as much as possible. Tom works in the front office as he doesn't have a medical background. We find shifts where we are both needed so we can go together. The need for medical care is large and continues to grow and we feel

everyone should have health care in a country as blessed as ours. One way of helping fulfill that goal is volunteering at free providers such as KC Free.

What they enjoy most about this volunteer opportunity: It is always rewarding to put in time at a clinic shift. The recipients are clearly in need (uninsured and often between jobs) and most grateful that they are being helped. Cindy sees this firsthand working in patient care. It is always a good feeling as we drive home and relate stories of the day both sad and joyful.

Advice or word of encouragement they would give to someone who doesn't have a volunteer passion: As we have found with all of our volunteer activities, the volunteer gets as much out of the experience as those that are on the receiving end. For those that haven't given their time in some of the myriad ways possible we would simply encourage them to try one thing one time. Our bet is they will then be on a continuing journey of volunteer activities.

Other organizations or groups they volunteer with: We also volunteer at Cross-Lines Food Kitchen (Cindy and Carol Pasley coordinate Country Club Christian Church's first Tuesday of the month preparation and serving of lunch there), our grandkids lunch program at their school, and pick up and deliver day-old bakery items from Hen House to Cross-Lines.

The Mysticism of October

There's something mystical about October. The cool air reminds us that summer is over, yet it's easier to enjoy those deep healing breaths. Summer annuals cease their blooming, but new grass grows, replenishing the spots created by long, hot summer days. The trees tell us that winter is coming, but the beauty of fall foliage touches our hearts even in their decline.

One of my favorite patients kept her strong spirit into her 90s. She had fought breast cancer, out-lived two husbands and was the family stronghold

even while her 11-year-old great grandson battled leukemia. Her forearms told the story of hard work on the farm. She loved gardening and animals – her safe havens from childhood abuse.

I was her minister in her final years, but I received so much from her. One day, after Dawn and I had to say good-bye to our dog Sugar, she was my Stephen Minister. She opened a book on the love of a dog for her family. We shared stories of our beloved pets and the day was filled with laughter and tears.

Still, in that last year, something wasn't right. Even the trees in her yard seemed to sense her decline. Her favorite tree, a Formosa, failed to bloom that summer. I feared this might be her final battle.

Then, October came. She fell and broke her hip. Her cancer returned and had spread. Her family moved her to a nursing home and, in two weeks, she was gone. Later, they asked me to officiate her memorial service. We met at the mortuary to plan her service. Yet, it just didn't feel right. I must admit arising out of my own needs, I asked if we could meet at her home, the place of meaningful memories. When we arrived, we all got out of our cars and in unison shouted, "The Formosa tree is in bloom!" It was truly a sacred moment. Nothing could have meant more to us – a reassurance of life in our time of loss. As a friend of mine once said, "You knew God would do something special. Yet when it happens, it's like the first time all over again."

No doubt it was a miracle. Even in our times of doubt, angst, loss and grief, there are moments of great beauty. October continues to show us our Creator and its mysticism is deeply comforting.


