## More on the Modern Church

My Feb. 12 sermon, "The Modern Church," received a great amount of comment. I am grateful for the many kind words. Many of our younger members have contacted me with their thoughts and ideas on how we might move as a congregation into this new era. I am grateful for their willingness to reach out and I look forward to hearing from many more of our members, young and old and in between, on what may be next for our marvelous congregation!

As I mentioned in the sermon, theologians and church historians are not sure yet what to call this change we are experiencing. This can be very disconcerting. Some folks will simply want to hold on to the past. Others may be tempted to grab hold of the fad of the moment and hope that something sticks.

The more difficult course is one that strikes a balance between holding on and reaching out, looking forward, while remembering our past. Faith columnist Bill Tammeus noticed my sermon title and sent me a report he thought I might find helpful. I did. It is a document he helped write for our friends over at Second Presbyterian Church. They note that the world is rapidly changing but people are still hungry for something spiritual. They quoted theologian Harvey Cox who wrote: "People turn to religion more for support in their efforts to live in this world and make it better, and less to prepare for the next. Faith is resurgent, while dogma is dying. The spiritual, communal and justice-seeking dimensions of Christianity are now its leading edge as the 21st century hurtles forward, and this change is taking place along with similar reformations in other world religions."

Cox says that this new era might be called "The Age of the Spirit." In other words, the old dividing lines among Christians may no longer matter. Through the power of the Spirit we may find the ability to move out to the world with the ability to invite people to a renewed sense of faith.

This is an exciting time to be a person of faith. I can't think of a congregation better equipped than Country Club Christian Church to move with dexterity and fluidity into this new era.

We will then assist families in selecting food items, moving through the food displays, and helping load the items in vehicles. The Harvesters' clients consist of families who might not otherwise have access to fresh produce. I encourage you to participate in this crucial and transformative effort.

This season of service will culminate in Grace At Work on Sat., Mar. 31. Watch for sign-ups in the parlor and on-line beginning later this month. Whether you're handy with a hammer, have a hankering to work outdoors or want to help out around the church, we hope you will make an effort to join in this fun and meaningful event.

## A Lesson in Legos

My son questions me with a twinge of tween attitude asking, "Why is it so important to you?" after another discussion about my desire for him to keep the Legos from living all over the floor of his bedroom. I could explain it's not safe for the dog who will see them as crunchy treats; or I could remind him how easily they are vacuumed up; or do I confess it just really bugs me and that should be enough of a reason. But without uttering a word I give him a look that indicates my answer is best left unstated and I leave his room.

His question really nags at me – Why is it so important? How do I become so obsessed with details like this? What I am seeking? What is the need I am trying to address? Is it the fact I really like a neat house and as much as I love my boys beyond words, they mess my house up and it irks me? Or do I need some reality check?

In that same timeframe I was revisiting a book I really like – *Welcome to the Wisdom of the World*. As I am reading one of the final chapters, a comment by the author Sister Joan Chittister leaps off the page – "What will really be important when all the important things fade?" It is a question I am sure we could all ask ourselves as we seek to re-center our lives in ways that make our daily living add up to something important. It is so easy to be pulled into thinking the things, tasks, accomplishments of this world are what is important. And in that, it is so easy to lose what really matters. God calls us to the important things of life from the moment of creation – relationship, loving and caring for one another. If we make that our priority, we are living faithful, fulfilling, important lives.

I walked into my son's room recently, seeing many Legos cast about the floor, and I simply sat down to ask how his day was, honoring the "important" things in life.
