Seeking Input on Prioritization of Facility Improvements

You are invited to attend a town hall meeting at noon on Sun., Jan. 16, in the Social Hall. This is your opportunity to give input on plans to improve the Country Club Christian Church facility.

Before we embark on the feasibility study to determine the possible level of financial support, we would like your input on setting priorities for our facility improvements. The items that we will present for your consideration will include:

- The structural engineering assessment and \$1.6 million cost forecast
- Parlor, social hall, and chancel improvements at a cost of \$600,000
- Organ upgrade and repair at a cost of \$250,000 to \$500,000

- Technology, video and sound improvements at a cost of \$270,000
- Survey of staff suggestions include moving gift shop, reconfiguring offices, adding small group meeting spaces, replacing carpet, upgrading north wing, upgrading restrooms, landscaping, upgrading kitchen, replacing water line and other improvements.
- A 10% tithe to outreach
- What is missing? What would you recommend that we consider as we dream and plan for the church we want to be on our 100th birthday?

On Being Forgiven

Jesus proclaimed, “Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven their sins...” This statement about forgiveness is very clear. There are no ifs, ands or buts added. Too often in the church we have added comments to that word of forgiveness. Too often we have said, “Well, yes, forgiveness is a gift for everyone and God will forgive every sin but...” When we speak like this we change Jesus’ universal message of forgiveness for all. In *The Message*, a contemporary translation of the Bible, the word from Jesus is even clearer: “Listen to this carefully. I’m warning you. There’s nothing done or said that can’t be forgiven.” The key word in that statement from Jesus is “nothing.”

Many of the problems we face in our personal and communal lives come from the inability to give and receive forgiveness. Some have said that most of the psychological and personal problems faced by Christians are connected to a failure to allow God’s forgiveness to take hold of their lives. I tend to agree.

Jesus is clear about the universality of forgiveness but immediately after making this comment about God’s forgiveness he says, “...but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of eternal sin.” This seems paradoxical. All are forgiven but not this one? What is going on here? *The Message* is helpful again: “Listen to this carefully. I’m warning you. There’s nothing done or said that can’t be forgiven. But if you persist in your slanders against God’s Holy Spirit, you are repudiating the very One who forgives, sawing off the branch on which you’re sitting, severing by your own perversity all connection with the One who forgives.”

Did you catch it? When you question the universality of God’s forgiveness for everyone and every sin you are sawing off the branch on which you are sitting. When you do that you are making it impossible for yourself to receive the very forgiveness that you may wish to deny to another person.

In other words, the only unforgivable sin is the failure to see that God forgives every sin, every person. The only unforgivable sin is to limit God’s grace, to limit God’s desire to bring all into the light of grace.

C.S. Lewis wrote, “To be a Christian is to forgive the inexcusable because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you.” We will learn how to forgive others when we are able to see and receive the forgiveness that has already been given to us.

In thinking back on 2010, I am reminded of the numerous small, seemingly insignificant yet priceless “church growth” moments that happened here on a daily basis. I wanted to share a few of my favorites with you.

During the warmer months, the hospitality table on the front lawn offered water to runners and walkers and water and dog biscuits to their dogs.

On numerous occasions you could hear “This table is the highlight of my walk each Sunday” or “You all are the nicest neighbors. Thanks for being so gracious week after week.”

When one of our 70 new members joined the church, she shared with me that from the moment she walked in that very first time, this church felt like “home” to her.

In casual conversation, I mentioned to a member that a certain visitor was planning to officially join the church the following month. She bounced out of her chair and asked, “Oh, can I please be his New Member Host?”

A visitor wrote a note of appreciation recently saying how moved she was when she was welcomed by two greeters who were standing out in the bitter cold to open the exterior door and welcome her.

Two visitors stopped by the church during the week to take a tour and get the lay of the land before their first official visit the next Sunday. During our conversation, they mentioned what they were looking for in a church and I remarked cleverly, “Well you’ve found it! No need to look any further!” They replied, “We know. We visited your website prior to coming here today and your website is very clear about who you are as a church.”

At the conclusion of the Kansas City Brass Concert every year, each person that attends receives a homemade cookie with an invitation to Christmas Eve services. This year, I overheard several members say as they exited the narthex, “Oh, no thank you. Give my cookie to a visitor.”

While individually, these stories are touching and heart-warming, collectively, they speak volumes about you. You are the common denominator in all of these. As we dream of what can be for this church, may we each realize our individual responsibility and collective potential in making those dreams come true so that more moments like these can happen this year.

Collection Connection

Health Supplies for Nicaragua

Country Club Christian Church is sending a group to Nicaragua to provide medical and construction work to the poorest of the poor. This group will be leaving Feb. 20 and returning on Feb. 27.

As part of this trip, the group will be providing home health kits to local families. They will provide the most basic of items we all take for granted for the most simple of everyday health issues. We are collecting the following items during January to take with us to Nicaragua: acetaminophen (Tylenol), ibuprofen (Advil), antacids (Tums), cough drops, antibiotic ointment (Neosporin), bandages, toothbrushes, adult vitamins, children’s vitamins (no gummies – they melt), prenatal vitamins (no softgels – they melt). Our greatest needs are for prenatal vitamins (no softgels – they melt in the heat) and antibiotic ointment. These two items are among the most expensive items we take with us and are of great importance to the people we will be visiting.

Due to restrictions on what we are allowed to bring into Nicaragua, we will be purchasing soap and toothpaste in Nicaragua to include in each kit.

11 Books to Read in 2011

Finding books to enrich your faith can prove challenging as most book stores do not carry a great selection and even “Christian” book stores don’t always offer a full range of choices. The Well, our church’s book store is a great resource for you. Most of the selections there have been recommended by one of our clergy.

1) *The Bible*. If you aren’t reading it maybe it is because your version is not very current or helpful. Try the *Harper Collins Study Bible** or the *New Interpreter’s Study Bible**.

2) *An Altar in the World* by Barbara Brown Taylor. One of my favorites. A great book about finding God in everyday life.

3) *Free of Charge: Giving and Forgiving in a Culture Stripped of Grace** by Miroslav Volf. The author grew up in the Christian minority in war-torn Yugoslavia and now teaches at Yale Divinity.

4) *A People’s History of Christianity* by Diana Butler Bass. Inspiring real life stories that fuel our modern faith.

5) *A Year with Jesus** by Eugene Peterson, a devotional book with a scripture, meditation and prayer for every day of the year written by a deeply faithful and intellectually solid man.

6) *To Begin at the Beginning** by Martin Copenhaver offers a way to put the pieces of the Christian story together with some intellectual sense.

7) *The Wisdom Jesus* by Cynthia Bourgeault highlights a new perspective on Christ and his message. This spiritual approach integrates the holy mysteries into daily life.

8) *Hannah Coulter** by Wendell Berry. A recent work of fiction that inspires new faith in God’s presence among us.

9) *City of Tranquil Light* by Bo Caldwell. This is on my list. I’ve read interviews and essays by the author and she shares her faith journey with integrity and profound beauty. The highly acclaimed work of fiction is a love story based on her grandparent’s missionary service in Asia.

10) *The Problem with The Resurrection** by Brandon Bernard Scott. The author teaches at a Disciples seminary in Oklahoma and has spoken at our church multiple times. He’s a rigorous scholar so be prepared to stretch your mind... I’m eager to read it for Lent/Easter.

11) *The Last Week By* Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan. Have you ever wondered what was really going on in the life of Jesus and the people around him during the last week of his life? This book places the Biblical stories in historical context to enrich our faith response to the sacred story.

The Samaritan Woman at the Well

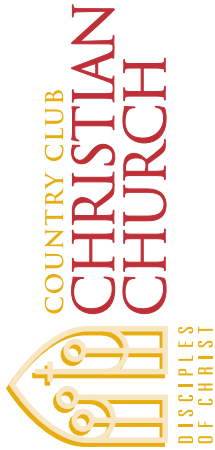
January 9 – February 6
