### Requiem to be Performed on April 10

On Good Friday evening, Apr. 10 at 7:00 p.m., the Chancel Choir, accompanied by orchestra will perform *Requiem, Opus 9* by Maurice Duruflé (1912-1986). Requiem was commissioned in 1947 and was written in memory of the composer's father. As a composer, Duruflé was a perfectionist. He revised his work constantly until he felt it was exactly as he wished it to be. Then, after much reworking, he would submit his manuscript to be published.

Unlike many settings of the Mass for the Dead, which can be quite dramatic, Duruflé's work is one of great comfort. Using the ancient chant melodies associated with the Requiem texts as the basis of his composition, he creates an atmosphere of deep intimacy and sublime beauty. Throughout this 50-minute work, the music washes over the listener in ways that evoke all human emotions. Although three different orchestrations exist, our performance will be accompanied by the 1961 orchestration which consists of strings, harp, timpani, trumpets and organ. Join us Good Friday at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary for this monumental and beautiful choral work.

## South Africa Mission News

*As this newsletter goes to press, Senior Minister Glen Miles and the South Africa mission team are still traveling. While Glen's with the team, we're filing this report on his behalf based on the team's blog entries, written by Katie Lamb. March 9, Day 1 – East London. One look at a home made of scraps of tin, side by side with thousands just like it, and we realized just how far from home we had come. A quarter of the township is estimated to have HIV/AIDS. The highlight was a visit to an elementary school. Our hearts were filled as we received one embrace after another from children who found no greater joy than having their picture taken or having the opportunity to serenade us. The cost to attend school is about 25 rand (approximately \$2.50) per month, but some children do not have this opportunity.

March 10, Day 2 – Initially, the Samaritan Centre operated out of a one room building. Three years ago, a new building was purchased that up to this point was rife with drugs and prostitution. But a woman named Rose, whose heart is as big as this country, thought it had more to offer. Members of our last mission team framed rooms in an empty shell of a building. Today, vegetable gardens fill the side lawn, windows allow the sunlight and breeze to pass through, a stove and microwave ease the work of the Centre's cooks, and the male and female patients have separate rooms. Patients tell us about the excellent treatment that they receive here – better care than at the hospital in East London. It is the generosity of our congregation, in large part, that has helped to make the space what it is today.

March 13, Day 5 – On Friday, we ventured even deeper into the South African countryside. The children and parents from the Them bani Day Care Centre greeted us with music and dancing. In two days – TWO DAYS!!! – we were able to spackle, prime and paint six rooms, tile and grout a kitchen floor, install new rain gutters, rip up linoleum and then paint and seal the floors, paint two extra-large sets of shelves, weed the Centre's and the church's yard, and paint the entire Xhosa church. And excuse me for bragging on the group, but Dawn, our mission partner in South Africa, said that Americans work harder than any of their other international visitors!

## Joys of Sabbath Rest

When the sunlight begins to linger over the evening hours, spring begins working its way under my skin. Slowly, those promises of new life uttered around Easter seem to be less like spiritual platitudes and more like organic realities. At our house spring means standing on the sidelines of outdoor soccer games, getting our fingernails in the backyard dirt to plant a few herbs, pumping up the bicycle tires for some long weekend treks through Kansas City's fabulous trails. Once the weather invites us back outside, the idea of keeping the Sabbath, that is resting in

God's presence to savor the gifts of creation and each other, seems more doable.

Of all the ten commandments, the hardest one to keep in this culture is "Remember the Sabbath." Who has time to rest? Recently I came across this passage by David Wells that captures the challenge many of us face. "Temptations to break the Sabbath are understandable: we are needed, we are vital, we have made commitments and need this extra time to fulfill them, we don't want to let people down, there is so much good that can be done. The temptation to break the Sabbath is the temptation to do extra good."

Ouch! How true that we are tempted, for such good reasons, to keep doing good and important work instead of sitting back and enjoying the work that has already been done over the past six days! Only when God rested on the "seventh day" did God get a chance to revel in the goodness of it all.

Many of us are so into "doing" that we have no idea what to "do" when we stop working.

Here are a couple of books that I would recommend reading – for pure pleasure: *The Whistling Season* by Ivan Doig, *The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society* by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Burrows. Or if you don't enjoy novels, try the latest book by one of the greatest spiritual writers of our time, Barbara Brown Taylor, entitled *An Altar in the World*.

Whether your idea of "resting" is a nap with the background noise of basketball, a stroll in the park on a sunny day, a cup of coffee with a friend, or an hour alone with a good book, I wish you the joys of Sabbath rest this Spring!

## A Song in Our Heart

Will the water be cold? Do we have to say anything? Should we bring towels? What if I am not sure about this? These are just some of the questions I have encountered in the Pastors' Class in the past weeks as we help this group of 6th and 7th graders prepare for their confession of faith and baptism on Palm Sunday. Even though we prepare them for baptism and we help the youth decide about their baptism and church membership, this sacred act is not principally about an individual making a decision – it is about God acting and the community of faith responding.

Author David Wells comments, “What happens at baptism is that God places a song in the new believer’s heart. This song can easily be forgotten, so the believer is baptized in the midst of their faith community who has learned the song, who knows the song so well they can sing it back to the one who sometimes forgets how it goes.”

The song is the story of God claiming each one of us as a beloved child of God – this song reminds us God’s spirit is in each of us. It is likely we have each had a time when we felt doubt or deep pain or profound loneliness and someone gently whispered the tune of God’s love, of God’s presence, of God’s grace to you – singing into you the melody your heart knows but your mind too often blocks out.

During this journey through Lent as individuals we may take time to reflect on our relationship with God. We may seek to be more mindful of the Creator’s love, which envelopes us from the beginning. Lent also provides us as a faith community with the time to renew God’s song of hope, compassion and love, a tune we fail to sing in our hearts as we busy ourselves in this world.

May these days of Lent leading us to Easter give us opportunities to sing to one another God’s grace filled affirmation...you are my beloved.


### Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday Schedule
