passages from the senior minister

After Easter

Easter asks us to name what we worry about and bring it to God. Easter asks us to face the things that we are afraid of the most (like death and taxes!) and place them on a cross shaped altar. Easter says "forget about being in control and give yourself to God." Scott Black Johnston, a preacher in New York City, says that Easter helps us see "that the most solitary thing we can do-die is not something that we do alone."

The question we must ask after Easter is this: Are we brave enough to look death in the face so

that we can get on to the task of living in the here and now?

Easter, finally, is all about laughter. It is the reversal of fortune, it is the surprise to end all surprises. It is about God having the last laugh over death. In the Eastern Orthodox Church they celebrate a day they call "hilariter." It means hilarity or merriment. They tell jokes. They fall on their faces laughing. We don't laugh on Good Friday. That is not a funny day. But after Easter we are expected to laugh! That reminds me of a story.

A man and his dog walk into an entertainment manager's office. "My dog talks," the man says. "Show me," the manager directs. The man asks the dog, "What is on top of a house? "Rrrroof." "What does sandpaper feel like?" "Rrrrough." Who was the best baseball player of all time? "Rrrruth." The manager yells, "That's it, get out of here. He doesn't talk. You're wasting my time!" As the man and the dog are walking away the dog looks up at his master and asks, "Dimaggio?"1

That is an Easter story. We don't expect the dog to talk. We don't go to a graveyard to find a corpse regenerating.

Do you want proof of Easter? Sorry but you won't find that here. If we can prove Easter then faith is unimportant. We don't prove Easter. It's like a good joke; either you get it or you don't.

Easter is the ultimate reversal of fortune. We don't come to church to understand Easter. We come, as one preacher said, "to stand under Easter until we are blessed!"

Christ is risen. He is risen indeed! Grace and peace to you,


Do you need books for your children or grandchildren? Do you need a Bible to use in your Bible study? Would you like to read a book mentioned in a sermon or

After nearly an hour of stories about the neighborhood, in-depth discussions of roofing and plumbing, and a few glasses of iced tea, Harry apologized for occupying our afternoon and made his way towards his rental car.

As he was leaving, he commented that he'd have to bring his wife by the house the next time he passed through town. "She'd love to see how happy the house is," he said. "You're welcome home anytime," I said as I shook his hand. We exchanged information and I extended an open invitation to dinner the next time he and Carol came in town. "Thanks for making me feel so at home on Easter Sunday," he said. With a tear in his eye, he added, "This was a great resurrection."

My hope is that the nearly 250 guests who joined us for worship earlier that day had an experience similar to Harry's. I pray they felt at home. I pray they want to come back. I pray they experienced some kind of a resurrection. Thanks to each of you who extended a hand, shared a smile or learned someone's name.

Eager to Share

Can you imagine being hungry? No, I mean really hungry? Not like, hungry for a favorite food or restaurant or candy. But just hungry. Hungry for enough to eat. Hungry to find food for your children or elderly parents. Hungry enough to wait two hours in line to receive a box of day old bakery goods and donated fresh produce.

On a beautiful spring Saturday morning, my husband, Dave, my son, Connor, and I showed up in a parking

lot at a church in south Kansas City. We had been sent there as part of the Grace at Work team organized by our church. Waiting there in the front parking lot were more than 100 cars, filled with families waiting to receive food. Busily working in the lower parking lot behind the church was a team of two dozen folks unloading fresh carrots, potatoes, lettuce and bakery items from a Harvesters truck. Once all the food was unloaded, we sorted it into piles. Then an assembly line formed to fill boxes of fresh food for each of the waiting families.

My favorite part of the assembly process was the bakery items. Several preteen boys and a few dads worked this area diligently. They first made a huge pile of all the breads – English muffins, bagels, dinner rolls, sour dough loaves. Then off to the side, they carefully stacked the more delicate dessert items – iced cakes, monster cookies, apple pies, chocolate iced brownies. Once the boxes were filled with produce, these boys and men topped off each box with soft bread and a dessert item. "Someone is going to be so happy to receive this delicious cake," one boy announced. "Oh, wow, look at these great big cookies," another declared. They smiled, salivated and smacked their own lips as they enthusiastically placed the treats on the top of each box.

I laughed and smiled at their eagerness to share what they so clearly loved themselves. And I thought that surely this was how God gives to each of us – eagerly, enthusiastically. God wants us to taste the goodness. God wants us to know the joy. And so with delight, God places before us a banquet table of life filled with bread and wine. Sometimes we don't notice that behind the gift is a giver eager to share the true delight with all of us who are truly hungry for life.
