

Sermon Series: Heaven on

Embodied Forgiveness

Theologian Stanley Hauerwas writes, "The work of Jesus was not a new set of ideals or principles for reforming or even revolutionizing society, but the establishment of a new community, a people that embodied forgiveness, sharing and self sacrificing love in its rituals and discipline. In that sense the visible church is not to be the bearer of Christ's message but to be the message."

His words remind me of something Fred Craddock likes to say. "The work of grace is to make us gracious."

The church is called to embody forgiveness, to bear Jesus' love and act with grace toward all. We don't live like this to earn our salvation. That act was done by God through the power of love over death, once and for all. We get a little confused about this though.

A while ago I was in the Phoenix airport waiting for a flight to Kansas City. A young man walked up to me. He asked, "Are you saved?" The man was sincere and we had a nice chat. He wanted to know about my confidence in eternal life.

But his query struck me as odd since the biblical notion of salvation is overwhelmingly concerned with the one life we have to live on this earth and only secondarily with the life eternal.

Salvation in the early church had to do with converting from living for your self to living for God and others. It was about turning from selfishness and turning toward selflessness.

The early church used to call it The Way. When you became a part of the way, you discovered who you really are and began to grow into becoming the unique and marvelous person that God has created you to be.

Bruce Van Blair writes, "The commitments of the Christian life are not about something we have to do to get saved. They are about what we do to move our lives into the passion and excitement of the...Christian Way."

This is an open invitation and a clear commandment to live our lives in love.

Can't Lose

Clear eyes. Full hearts. Can't lose. So says the determined Coach Taylor to his team of nervous high school football players each game day before they take the field. And every time, goosebumps gather on my arms and I get that excited, anxious feeling associated with competition, strategy and suspense.

Yes, I'm a little late to *Friday Night Lights*, the drama series which ended in 2011, having never watched an episode during its run. But thanks to the miracle of Netflix, I've been eagerly making my way through the stories of this small-town

Texas team under tremendous pressure to win. I am fascinated by the symbiotic relationship between the team and the town.

What can I say? I'm a small-town girl and a big-time sports fan. Football is my greatest love. The years I spent on the sidelines as a cheerleader honed my respect for and attraction to the game...roaring crowd on one side; strategy, athleticism and teamwork on the other. A lifelong Mizzou fan, I've weathered my share of disappointment at the hands (and feet) of this game I love. And though each fall—for the last few years anyway—I've entered the season a cynic, somehow the Chiefs always manage to suck me back in, if only for a game or two.

Perhaps it's because there is something magical about thousands of fans coming together in support of a common idea. Likewise, there is magic in 11 players lining up with one shared goal. The result is a beautiful puzzle assembled from random pieces of muscle, strength and stamina; of spirit, loyalty and support.

Where does it come from, that enthusiasm, that electricity? How do you capture and recreate it? I often think that if 70,000 of us could get together every Sunday and agree on something important, like addressing world hunger or poverty...well, that would certainly be something magical and worthy of cheering.

Instead, you and I gather in church, a ragtag team from disparate backgrounds with a few shared beliefs, a communal spirit, and a desire to make the world a better place. And though I know Glen would love to preach to a sanctuary just as packed as Arrowhead Stadium is on Sundays, maybe what's more important is the magic we share when we are moved by the message and the music, when we serve our neighbors here and around the world, and when we understand, with clear eyes and full hearts, what grace really is all about. And when we do, well...we can't lose.
