**DBS I** - For individuals who want to read the Bible from start to finish, DBS I is an in-depth study of the Bible. The title of the class is *Becoming Disciples through Bible Study*. The materials use biblical language and images and draw upon the work of scholars to aid understanding of the Bible. The titles of the sessions along with theme words, theme verses, and major persons, events, and topics will set the sequence of the biblical story in the minds of the participants.

**Wednesday Mornings** – Led by Lesley Holt, this class meets every week from 9:00-11:00 a.m.

**Wednesday Evenings** – Led by Ken Hubbell, this class meets every other week for two years. The first year covers the Old Testament; the second year features the New Testament. This evening class is targeted for working individuals.

### Advanced DBS

**Tuesday Mornings** – Led by Tepríng Crocker every Tuesday from 9:30-11:30 a.m., this class is for individuals who have already taken DBS I or II. *Under the Tree of Life* is a 32-week study concentrating on the writings in the Old Testament – Ruth, 1 and 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon, Lamentations, and Daniel. New Testament scriptures include the Gospel of John; 1, 2 and 3 John; James; Jude; and Revelation.

## Good to Great

by Dr. R. Glen Miles



Jim Collins, the author of the book *Good to Great*, wrote a monograph for non-profit groups as a supplement to his best seller. He understands that in the social sectors—places like churches—there is an argument that they should be “more like a business.” He argues that it is very important for us to “reject the idea—well intentioned, but dead wrong—that the primary path to greatness in the social sectors is to become ‘more like a business.’ Most businesses—like most of anything else in life—fall somewhere between mediocre and good.

Few are great. When you compare great companies with good ones, many widely practiced business norms turn out to correlate with mediocrity, not with greatness.”

One of the key factors in Collins’ argument is a culture of discipline. He says that most businesses and churches have a desperate need for greater discipline. Mediocre churches rarely display discipline. The church needs “disciplined people who engage in disciplined thought and who take disciplined action.”

Our disciplined thought and action begin with the cross of Jesus Christ. It is there that we see love made real. It is there that we will find Strength for the Journey and Grace for the Soul.

The cross reminds of the demands that are placed on a community founded in love and grace. There will be time when this message is rejected or, worse, ignored. However, we are called to carry this message forward believing and hoping that it is the single word that moves us.

Collins says that “A culture of discipline is not a principle of business; it is a principle of greatness.” Everything we do in this church must be evaluated with a disciplined and thoughtful understanding of our vision for ministry.

Measuring greatness is not an easy thing to do. There are many, many factors in the church—things like attendance and income and programs and ministries and a host of other possibilities—that may point to greatness or mediocrity. However, the one thing we must always pay attention to is our ability to love one another. Jesus prayed for that. Paul wrote about it. The world is desperate for it.

Greatness begins and ends in the humble gift of love made real.

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## Better Than Homemade Apple Pie

Last week, a friend invited me to join her at a pastry class at a local culinary center. Having never been there before, I had no idea what to expect but was looking forward to it. I arrived at the center a few minutes early and entered a room bustling with activity and noise. I must have looked like a fish out of water, because a bubbly woman who obviously worked there greeted me by my name, handed me a nametag and a glass of iced tea. I met up with my friend and the three-hour class was quickly underway.

Everything about the experience was absolutely delightful, from the recipe booklet we each received, to the ample supplies that were available, to the pleasant company of the women we shared a table with. For three hours, we measured, rolled, chopped, baked and laughed hysterically.

Before reconvening with the rest of the class for the conclusion, I took a few seconds to fill out the evaluation form I had been given earlier that evening. I very simply wrote, “The food was great, but the fellowship was even better!” It was as if everything the staff did that night said, “You are noticed and you are welcome here.” Having not even sampled the fruits (literally!) of our labor yet, I knew that even if it was the best pie in the world, it couldn’t hold a candle to the cumulative experience. The final pastry product was only a small portion of what made this evening a memorable one. Don’t get me wrong...that’s not to say I wasn’t excited about the food. On my way home that night, I called Scott and asked him to have the plates, forks and vanilla ice cream ready to go because there was a bubbling hot apple and walnut pie on my front seat! As Scott and I sat at the table eating our pie, we studied the catalog of class offerings and salivated over the decision of what class to take next.

It is my prayer that when guests leave here each Sunday, they do so saying, “The sermon was awesome, but the fellowship was even better!” I hope that when they get home and flip through their Ministry and Events Guide, they will salivate over what event or class to try next. It is my wish that every element of their experience says “you are loved, you are noticed and you are welcome here.” I would challenge you to think about how you can be a part of making these experiences a reality, whether it’s serving as a greeter, handing a visitor a worship bulletin or simply smiling and introducing yourself to someone you don’t know. You are a part of the cumulative experience. It wouldn’t taste nearly as sweet without you.

## Unstructured Time

When folks ask me what the highlight of my sabbatical was, my mind freezes up. I begin to hem and haw. I twist my neck and wrinkle up my face. I am afraid that no matter what I say, it will be inadequate. If I tell you that the three months away were like one long Sunday afternoon that was absolutely magnificent would you believe me? If I tell you that I began to feel alive in a new way, utterly free to connect again with God, with friends, with family, with myself, would that sound silly? Trying to find the words to capture the totality of the experience is like trying to find

the words to describe heaven.

I think back to the two weeks I spent at the monastery in Tuscany listening to the priests sing Gregorian chants in a 12 century abbey. Eight times a day the priests from France, from Albania, from Italy, filed in wearing white robes, bowed to the cross and sang a cappella the psalms and the prayers that date back thousands of years. In the solitude and simplicity of that place it was easy to believe again that God still hovers close to humanity and seeks a way to create peace among us.

Then my mind scans the artistic treasures of Rome and Florence. I recall the first day in Rome when I meandered through the windy streets to find the church that houses Bernini's famous sculpture of "St. Teresa in Ecstasy." Or the next day when I was absolutely stunned by the same sculptor's "Apollo and Daphne" practically floating in the air like feathers.

But just as vividly I remember the conversations that naturally unfolded as my 13-year-old son Connor and I bounced down the narrow moonlit cobblestone streets of Rome. And the carefree dialogue with my husband Dave as we strolled along the Adriatic coastline early in the mornings before sitting down for a hot cappuccino.

One of the most fruitful experiences was the writing class I took in New Haven, CT. Sitting at the feet of one of my favorite authors, Nora Gallagher, I delighted in learning new ways to approach the sacred task of writing. Then I sat at my computer every morning for the rest of the summer practicing these new methods. When I ran out of words and ideas, I sat staring at the computer, until another thought emerged, listening for the spirit to awaken me to deeper reality.

Perhaps the true test of sabbatical is not how it is summarized in words, but how different a person becomes after tasting the heavenly delight of unstructured time. Like faith, the purpose of sabbatical is to transform us. The Christian life becomes real when the Word is made flesh; when you and I begin living new lives.


