

passages from the senior minister

Sabbatical Reading

One of the finest gifts of my sabbatical time away was the opportunity to read. Here is an annotated list of my favorite books from the summer.

The Art of Racing in The Rain, by Garth Stein. This sweet little novel is the story of a race car driver and his young family as told through the thoughts of the family dog. The most thought provoking line from the book: "You cannot win a race on the first lap but you can lose it." You'll hear that line again from the pulpit in the very near future!

Another novel made my top six list, *Putting Away Childish Things: A Tale of Modern Faith* by Marcus Borg. Borg is a theologian (and a darn fine one, too) who normally writes on theological and ecclesiastical concerns. This is "a didactic novel," one in which he attempts to teach about the religious issues of American life today.

Karen Armstrong's book, *The Battle for God: A History of Fundamentalism*, traces the development of fundamentalism in Islam, Judaism and Christianity. She carefully analyzes each of these religions and the "fundamentalisms" that emerged in them as a response to the enlightenment. Her thoughtful work is worth the effort.

I thoroughly loved Barbara Brown Taylor's, *An Altar in the World*. It is an invitation to immerse ourselves in the "practice" of faith. The chapter on prayer was worth the price of the book. Her honest reflection, "I am a failure at prayer," helped me rediscover the practice of prayer not as a thing to be achieved but as an opportunity to be present to God, no matter the setting or place.

Saving Jesus From The Church, by Robin Myers, was easily the most provocative to me on my reading list. In the opening chapter he writes, "There is a deep hunger for wisdom in our time, but the church offers up little more than sugary nostalgia with a dash of fear." That was not easy to read but his prophetic voice is powerful.

Brian McLaren, the well-known evangelical pastor and author, takes a gentler approach than Myers but he reaches many of the same conclusions in his work, *A New Kind of Christianity*. McLaren declares to the church, "The excellent way—no, the more excellent way—no, better than that, the still more excellent way—is the way of love." Amen Brother Brian!

I hope you'll be inspired to pick up one or more of these books and read them. Let me know if you do because I'd love to hear your thoughts and reactions. Grace and peace to you,

As I write this article, there are 12 days until the preschool and Parents' Day Out program resumes. The question I am asked the most (besides "What day do they start?" from the parents) is "Are you ready for school to start?"

The weeks leading up to the start of Weekday Programs are very busy (second only to that first week of school). The classrooms are torn down for cleaning, repairs and painting, and then put back together. Families stop by to drop off paperwork or to look at their new classroom. The

phone rings consistently with last minute questions and potential families calling to inquire about the program. Staff come in to drop things off in their classroom and glance at their class list.

The week is a flurry of activities with teacher meetings, staff preparing their classrooms, new employee orientation, "Meet the Teacher" day and all of the last minute details to take care of before we start back on Sept. 8. Mentally I go over the to-do list, which seems to get longer, even though I cross things off. Amidst all the activity, there is something missing. There are no good morning smiles, books sit unread, there is no music. It is too quiet.

Time away to regroup and refocus is so important. Now summer winds down and for us, it's time to get back to the business of children. So to answer that frequently asked question, "Yes, I am ready for school to start."

God of Transformation, Working Now

Much of the debate over the "Ground Zero Mosque" makes it seem as though there are two groups that are completely beyond commonality—but in the case of Park51 (the name of this proposed community center) isn't the fighting happening between two groups within the same family? Both Islam and Christianity belong to the Abrahamic family that claims God is one and that God seeks peace and wholeness for all of creation. While we have different sacred texts (although the Qur'an has portions of biblical narrative including stories of Jesus), worship differently and have

unique traditions, the foundation of our faith is rooted in the same covenant with Abraham and we are still called to support our Muslim family.

The August 16 Newsweek issue is devoted to the subject of Park51. But the article that grabbed my attention was by Fareed Zakaria, who reminds readers that promoting moderate Islam is exactly what America desires. Our country touts diversity and freedom, for individuals and religions. What better expression of Islam is there than a mosque that seeks to continue its members' witness in a troubled community, offering love in a neighborhood that is still pained? Should Christians, who are the major economic and political powerbrokers, turn a blind eye to God's transformative work going on in that community? What precedent do we have for supporting Park51? I say the cross.

Each time we reference the cross, we affirm God's ability to change terror into peaceful reconciliation. We find meaning through Jesus and claim God worked through his crucifixion and resurrection to distort a torture device into the means of grace. In fact, God desired that this cruel and gruesome form of punishment be subverted by becoming a world-wide symbol of peace, love and forgiveness.

What greater faith testimony is there than for people to create a place of peace and rest for a community deeply in need of such things? The congregants of Park51 are seeking to love future generations, teach God to the current generation and offer hope to the community—something on which I think both Christians and Muslims can agree. I not only support the effort to build Park51, but I thank God that these people are doing so and pray that we can be transformed by such love. May we all learn a few lessons about forgiveness, faith and reconciliation.
