## Conduct Yourselves Honorably

Back in January of 2003, I woke early, looked out our bedroom window and saw that there was about six inches of snow on the ground. I know now that six inches of snow is no big deal in Kansas City but we had just moved here from Atlanta. Six inches of snow there will shut everything down. I looked out at the snow, and said to my wife, “Toto, we’re not in Kansas anymore.” She laughed because we had moved to Kansas, but she knew what I was getting at.

Dorothy’s famous words to her little dog were not about geography. They were about the fact that things had dramatically changed for her and her little dog. The tornado had taken them to a whole new land where everything was different. There were flying witches, men made out of tin and talking scarecrows. It wasn’t just geographical change Dorothy encountered. It was a complete cultural transformation.

The Church Universal is undergoing a similar shift. Brian McLaren wrote about these changes in his book, *A New Kind of Christian*. He used the imagery from the *Wizard of Oz* to make a very similar point: The church is no longer in Kansas. Churches like ours need to pay attention to the changes that are occurring around the world and prepare to respond to them with the undying gospel of Jesus Christ and God’s unconditional love.

There was a time when the church was at the center of society. Sundays and Wednesdays were reserved for church activities. No one would dare schedule a little league baseball game (or anything else) on those days. Now, the church is on the margin. This feels sad but there is good news here. The church in the first century was on the margin also. Although our situations are not parallel, we can learn from the early church. The church was formed in the midst of conflict and oppression but it flourished. Did it flourish because they had the government lined up on their side? Money? Power? No. They grew because as the title of this column instructs (it is a quote from Peter), they conducted themselves honorably.

Conducting ourselves honorably means we pay attention to and live by the teachings of Jesus. We learn to pray for those who persecute, to love God, neighbor and maybe, if we can find the courage, to love enemy. We care for the least of these. We give ourselves to each other and the world in the name of grace.

Change is hard but it is also an opportunity for new life to begin.

## What Would You Do...?

About a year and a half ago, as the anticipation of a big birthday ending in a zero began creeping into my consciousness, I decided it was time for a challenge. So I started training, and in September I completed my first triathlon. Three days later, I began training for my first half marathon, and in November, finished it in a totally respectable time of two hours, seven minutes.

Never, in my wildest dreams, did I imagine I could run that far, or compete in a multi-discipline sport. But I did. So as we enter 2012, I'm wondering what we, as a church, might accomplish if we weren't afraid to fail? If we weren't afraid to take risks, to be challenged, to think big ... Where would we go? Who would we serve? What problems could we help solve? How might we transform the world?

In this next year, I'm challenging myself to take some risks and be innovative when it comes to communications for Country Club Christian Church. The way you and I receive and consume information is changing rapidly, and it's important to keep up, to stay on top of trends, and to adjust accordingly.

As we do, I encourage you to embrace the change that might come and not be afraid of trying something new.

Eleanor Roosevelt said, "Do one thing every day that scares you." Just imagine where we all might go if we, as Glen often says from the pulpit, "leave fear behind."

## A Place Like Home

My husband and I were sitting in the den when I heard someone turn the back door handle. In walked Kyle, Dave's son. "Hey, how's it going?" As we chatted I realized that there are very few places where one can just "walk in" without knocking. Even though Kyle is 30 and hasn't lived at home for 12 years, our home is still his home, a place where he can walk in, any time and feel at home.

And then I realized that there is only one other place where I can just "walk in" without knocking and that is 2327 Colonial Parkway in Fort Worth,

TX. But this week my parents are moving out of that home where they have lived since I was 10. And in a few more days the wrecking crew will come to demolish that old house and there will no longer be that other place where I can just "walk on in."

At first I thought it seemed silly that I even noticed these passages. So what. Isn't a place just a place? Does it really matter? But then I realized that even as I am letting go of one place that has been formative in my life, I am also preparing to visit another place that has become very familiar to me.

In a few weeks I will travel with our church's mission team to Nicaragua. It used to feel like going to a foreign country, but now it feels like hopping a plane just five hours straight south of Kansas City to visit some good friends. I will carry with me a baby gift for one Nicaraguan friend whose wife is expecting in February, and a favorite U.S. beverage for another Nicaraguan friend. I look forward to hearing the parrot on the patio say "Buenos Dias" and to eating "gaillo pinto" frequently. I imagine again trying to fall asleep when every bone is tired from the day's physically demanding work but the roosters and dogs are just revving up to perform their evening symphony. I realize that I am going to a place where I feel at home and the door is always open for me to just walk on in.

A few years back our mission trip team decided that rather than just doing good work around the world we would form partnerships with particular places. When we made that decision, I never dreamed that I would find a place that felt like home in another culture where I don't speak the language. But God works in mysterious ways, inviting us to feel at home in places we never imagined.
