### passages from the senior minister

### An Inclusive Gospel by Dr. R. Glen Miles



One of the most important aspects of the "emerging church" movement is the idea of inclusiveness. Many research organizations and reports are noting that people no longer search for a church based on "brand" loyalty. Fifty years go if you were a member of a Christian Church like Country Club and you moved away to another city you would simply find the closest Christian Church and soon thereafter place your membership there. That is no longer the case.

Today people search for churches based on factors like the message proclaimed week in and week out, the ministries offered and the overall mission of the church. This is why inclusivity is such an important issue. On any given week at Country Club Christian you may find yourself seated between a Presbyterian and a Pentecostal or a Baptist and Buddhist even!

Peter Gomes makes the very strong point that this inclusivity is something we can find in Jesus. Gomes writes, "If the gospel is truly good news, it has to be good news for everyone, for it is either an inclusive gospel or no gospel at all. Prejudice, paranoia, the politics of exclusion—all these little systems have their day, and there are moments when they appear to prevail, but the church, we know from experience, will eventually do the right thing once it has exhausted every other alternative."

Jesus was constantly welcoming all kinds of people into his circle of friends and followers whose backgrounds caused the pious and the self-righteous to shudder. A close examination of the disciples themselves reveals an extremely flawed group of persons. I once preached a sermon on the disciples titled "Only the Unqualified Need Apply."

The flawed disciples help to reveal the beauty of the gospel of Jesus Christ. God is not waiting for us to attain perfection. Instead, God invites us to acknowledge our brokenness as we move our lives into the center of grace itself. When we are able to do that we become, as Hemingway suggested, "strong in the broken places."

This gift of grace then guides and directs us toward lives lived with love at the center. When that happens in a congregation, the walls of exclusivity evaporate and the pews become sacred places of hope and healing.

### **Prayer Vigil**

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"You may not consider yourself a 'prayer warrior'," said Zimmerman. "You may be more disposed to specific concrete actions directed toward resolving a specific problem. But, as Christians, it seems that prayer is a good place to start a movement of change."

Zimmerman developed the idea for this prayer vigil after reading daily news reports about the escalating violence in our community, resulting in a murder rate that is among the highest per capita in the nation. In particular, the recent "Precious Doe" trial and a record-setting 21 murders in August caused Zimmerman to ask what we as Christians can do to address something that has such a profound affect on our community.

The Elders invite you to join them at the partner congregation's church, Bethlehem Christian Assembly, at 2732 Forest, Kansas City, MO. "We'd appreciate your presence with us at Bethlehem if possible, but if you can't make it, please schedule some time to pray during those hours wherever you may be," said Zimmerman. "We will be praying specifically for insight and guidance regarding the escalating murder rate. We will be praying for the families and friends of the victims, the community, the justice system in our community, law enforcement officers, and for those who can have a positive impact on this problem, such as educators, pastors, community leaders and others. Come explore the power of prayer with us."

### A Lesson in Conversation by Lara Schopp, Director of Communications



She was probably 50 years old, but her lined face and dark eyes indicated many more. Her ducked head, slumped shoulders and dragging feet betrayed her exhaustion. Her clothes, inappropriate for the warm weather and riddled with stains and snags, and her tattered plastic bag suggested a meager income. As we waited together at the bus stop, this woman's demeanor did not invite conversation, and though I smiled weakly as she sat to my left, I did not speak.

However, my 4-year-old Caroline, who doesn't

know a stranger, struck up a conversation with the woman, excitedly telling her that we were going to a festival at Crown Center. At first she tried to maintain her blank expression, but despite the exhaustion, despite the rough day or maybe the rough life she'd had, the woman couldn't help but smile as Caroline detailed all the things she planned to do once we arrived at our destination: ice cream, moonwalks, dancing.

Then Caroline said to her, "I just had my birthday!" Never mind that her birthday was nearly six weeks prior, it was still fresh in her mind. "You did?!" the woman asked. "How old are you?" Caroline proceeded to tell her all the details of her birthday party: the kind of cake we had, the many presents she opened, the friends with whom she celebrated.

By now we were halfway to our destination and this woman was completely charmed by the child. Wonder and interest replaced her dark, tired features as she listened intently to Caroline's incessant babbling. Light shone in her previously vacant eyes.

A few moments later, when Caroline was looking away, the woman held out her hand and dropped something into mine. As I glimpsed the crumpled onedollar bill, I looked at her in confusion. "It's for your daughter," she said. "Tell her it's a birthday gift, for her piggy bank." Tears burned my eyes as I tried to refuse the money. This was a woman for whom one dollar meant a lot. She insisted, and seeing the pride in her eyes, I sensed she felt great joy in giving something of her own to make someone else smile.

I usually try to write about communications, and this story doesn't seem to have much to do with that topic, except maybe it does. In a few minutes of friendly chatting, Caroline made an impression on a stranger. She made someone smile. In a world filled with virtual communication, email and text messaging often take the place of old-fashioned talking. That day, I saw that something as humble as a child's conversation can produce positive energy.

Almost 90 years have passed since the first meeting of our congregation. Throughout this time the members of Country Club Christian Church have striven to create a

### Weekly Thanksgiving by Rev. Carla Aday, Senior Associate Minister



Ann Patchett's novel *Run* lifts up many of the same themes that resound in our lives during the season of Thanksgiving. What really constitutes a family? What thread connects us to one another when our lives grow in divergent directions? How do Americans in this melting pot continue to seek wholeness in the midst of myriad inequities? How does the faith story of our ancestors echo in our present reality?

I enjoyed reading *Run* not only because it was a brilliant and compelling story whose characters

intrigued and delighted me but also because I found these topics of faith, family, community, brokenness and the quest for truth and meaning so artfully portrayed. As each of us turns our attention to Thanksgiving, mindful of the table where we will gather with family or friends, we may begin to wrestle again with the characters and contours that shape our own lives. What connects us? What divides us? Who will show up for Thanksgiving dinner? Who will be absent? What words will be unspoken but felt by all in the room?

The same questions arise when we gather at church around the Lord's Table. What holds the family of faith together? What rips at our fabric? As we break bread and sip wine we remember brokenness of life and hear again God's summons to wholeness. A weekly Thanksgiving of sorts.

I believe that our table fellowship during holy communion becomes richer when we share ordinary table fellowship with folks in the church. That is why the program entitled "Building Community Book by Book" brings people together to discuss a book. Elsewhere you will read in the newsletter about where to purchase the book *Run*. In January of 2009 you'll be asked to attend a one-time discussion group (at the kitchen table, over coffee, while sharing a piece of pie in someone's living room) and share your reflections about the book. Then in February the author will visit us. My hope is that the themes of the book will not only be talked about but experienced by our church. Together, we will grow in gratitude for the gifts on our collective table.
