Tammeus is a former nationally syndicated columnist for *The Kansas City Star*, and Rabbi

Cukierkorn, descended from Polish rabbis, is the spiritual leader of the New Reform Temple in Kansas City, MO. The book tells the stories of Polish Holocaust survivors and their rescuers. The authors traveled extensively in the United States and Poland to interview some of the few remaining participants before their generation is gone.

Way back in 1978, when I was a college summer intern at the First Christian Church of San Francisco, all of us on staff attended a Wednesday night worship service at the Greater Saint Beulah Church of God in Christ, a congregation that met just down the street from First Christian. The service was a wonderful experience.

After a few prayers and some announcements, it came time to take up the offering. As the deacons gathered at the front to get ready to receive the gifts, the choir began a rock-n-roll-like anthem, one that had the entire congregation up and singing within a few measures. As the singing continued, the pastor came to the microphone, quieted the choir and invited everyone to come to the front with their tithes and offerings.

I was really glad that I had a few one dollar bills in my pocket as we made our way to the front. The music continued to crescendo as the entire congregation filed past the deacons who were holding the offering plates near the chancel. As soon as everyone had returned to their seats, the choir director moved us on to the next hymn. However, in the middle of that song, one of the deacons went to the microphone. The choir softened again and hummed quietly in the background as the deacon told us that they had not collected enough. The choir rose in joyful noise and the entire congregation again got up and filed its way to the front. I was REALLY glad that I had a few more dollars in my wallet!

What caught my attention in that moment was the joy that the congregation experienced with the opportunity to give. There were no speeches being offered, no passionate pleas for funds. Just the matter of fact report that they were short for the evening's needs and it was time to dig a little deeper. This style of giving and worship may not fit the culture at Country Club Christian Church but I wonder what might happen if we could discover the same joy of giving that was so evident on that night?

In the long run, it's really not about money. It is about the opportunity to joyfully respond to God's blessings.

So, if you see my toe tapping during the offertory anthem this Sunday you'll know that I am enjoying our marvelous choir while remembering what it means to give with gladness.

Enough

It was a cold winter day in December several years ago when we pulled off the I-70 exit to my hometown of Higginsville. There at the top of the exit ramp was an old man standing with his sign asking for money. I rolled down my window and handed him some money. After all, I had just checked my billfold to see if I had cash for McDonald's for our lunch and I knew I had enough.

Before I had time to roll the window up, my 3-year-old said, "What did you just give him?" I explained we were getting ready to have lunch and that maybe he needed some money for his own lunch, so I shared with him. Her reply was, "It's so cold out, why isn't he sitting in his car?"

That's when I knew that explaining to a 3-year-old about a possibly homeless person would be a challenge. Not to mention, I didn't know this man's situation; whether or not the money would be used for lunch. I remember just keeping it simple, that we had enough money that day and shared. These days I try not to analyze every situation about "to give or not to give." I just know that usually my family has enough and it feels right to share.

This month we have been talking at Club Kids about what it looks like to have enough. For each family, I'm sure this definition is different and opens up an opportunity for dialogue. When talking about "enough" as in food, I'm sure most of us rarely miss a meal and can easily find an after-school snack.

In planning activities for the children and families at Country Club Christian Church this year, we are focusing on hunger. In November, families will be able to participate in "Fill the Ark," raising money for Heifer International. Heifer International provides dozens of different species of animals—from ducks to camels to llamas and geese—to people around the world. Please be sure to look for these materials in the children's wing and help us express God's grace by giving to others.

Precautions Implemented this Flu Season

With the convergence this year of the 2009 H1N1 flu and seasonal influenza, it is more important than ever for everyone to be prepared to help fight flu. Country Club Christian Church is taking proactive steps to prevent the potential spread of any contagious disease, including H1N1.

The church has implemented the following policies.

- ◆ Ample bottles and dispensers of hand sanitizer have been placed throughout the main building and the chapel, including restrooms.
- ◆ Communion bread is being cubed prior to the 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. services so people do not have to touch more of the bread than the piece they are picking up.
- ◆ The maintenance staff is being extra vigilant in sanitizing surfaces and handrails.
- ◆ Boxes of tissues are available throughout the building.

If you're uncomfortable shaking hands because of the potential for passing of the virus, especially following the worship service, don't be concerned that you will offend the minister at the door. You may always say hello without extending your hand.

Remember the basics of flu prevention and practice these habits throughout the day and become a prevention advocate by encouraging others to adopt these same practices. Wash your hands, cover your mouth and avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth.

They also discussed how the book of Esther teaches us of the dangers of using our power and privilege to justify the ideals, viewpoints, or actions of our own community without taking the time to see how they might damage or harm the well-being of others.

A Spiritual Team

I've been standing on the sidelines for 10 years. Shouting. Encouraging. Wincing. Handwringing. Hoping. When he was 4, I just hoped that he would run in the proper direction, not score for the other team and run hard enough to burn off some energy. Once he caught on to the game I began to worry that he'd get hurt. When a player was on the ground, I'd begin to pray – that he would get up, that nothing was broken. If it was my kid, I'd pray that I wouldn't embarrass him by running out on the field before the coach motioned me over. When it was another

mom's kid, I'd pray for that mom. Even when it was a kid wearing the opposition's uniform, I'd feel the tears coming to my eyes, until he limped off the field to our hoorays and applause.

This past Saturday I realized I was no longer watching little kids play. Rather I was seeing young men, most of who could wallop me in arm wrestling or out run me in a foot race, play a genuine team sport. They passed the ball and talked to one another. A goal was always attributed to a team effort not one hotshot kid. A magnetic force seemed to unfold on the field. We parents on the sidelines pulled not only for our kid but for the whole team.

The joy I experience as a soccer mom is echoed in my role as pastor. I have watched from the sidelines as a toddler runs down for the children's sermon, then runs off to college and later returns to the chancel steps to say "I do." I have cheered as someone afraid to sleep on the floor fell in love with mission trips because of the exhilaration that comes with serving the poor. I have encouraged a Bible study novice who later became a Bible study teacher! Christianity is a learned sport. It takes years to cultivate a mature faith. In fact, it takes more than one lifetime.

And when we begin to grow strong spiritual muscles, we begin functioning as a team. We ache when another hurts. We rejoice when another celebrates. We no longer seek simply our own personal success but we seek the health of the body of Christ. A mysterious synergy carries us to new spiritual heights.

When folks tell me "I can be a Christian alone. I don't need the church," it sounds as logical to me as saying "I can grow up without parents cheering on the sidelines" or "I can play soccer alone." Sure, you could, but what would be meaningful about that?
