The Heart of Christmas

December 25, was officially sanctioned as Christmas Day by Bishop Liberius of Rome in 354 AD. However, the roots of the way we celebrate Christmas are relatively new when placed on a historical continuum. Most of what we would call traditional celebrations can be traced to Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol; Clement Clark Moore's An Account of a Visit from St. Nicholas, which tells of a chubby character who flies from housetop to housetop in a tiny sled pulled by eight reindeer; and Washington Irving's The Sketchbook of Geoffrey Crayon, a

series of stories about the celebration of Christmas in an English manor house. Some believe that Irving invented these "traditions" as a way of promoting a less raucous celebration of the holiday. Hmm, that might be an idea worth reconsidering!

Our culture seems to have taken Christmas and turned it into something that neither the good Bishop nor any of the authors above would recognize. I was in a grocery store on Oct. 30. My wife had called and asked me to pick up some Halloween candy on the way home. I asked a store clerk, "Where is the Halloween candy?" She said, "Right next to the Baby Jesus on aisle 13." Sure enough there was the Baby Jesus, Joseph and Mary and eight tiny reindeer all seemingly waiting for the chance to dig into a pile of M&Ms and Snickers. I guess the new holiday slogan in America is "Happy Merry Thanksgivoween!1"

Before we let the culture take it all away from us, it is interesting to note that the one theme that seems to come up over and over again in both the biblical accounts and the traditional stories of Christmas, is an overwhelming concern for the poor. Read through the prophets of the Old Testament like Amos, Hosea, Jeremiah and Isaiah and you'll find a similar concern. Turn to Ezekiel for example and ask him, "Why was Sodom destroyed?" You might expect a titillating story full of wild behavior. Instead, Ezekiel will tell you, "They had excess of food and prosperous ease but they did not aid the poor and needy and the widows."

You know something? If we ever learn to put that teaching into practice and share with God's children all over the world, angels might appear again and sing, "Glory to God in the highest. Peace on earth to all."

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Christianity Is a Path

Father Thomas Keating was the leader of a Catholic monastery in Massachusetts for 20 years. During his tenure, the Catholic retreat center down the street was closed and sold to a Buddhist group. The facility reopened as an Insight Meditation Center. Suddenly Father Keating noticed that more and more people, mostly young people, were stopping by the monastery to ask for directions to the Insight Meditation Center. Intrigued and dismayed, Father Keating asked these young seekers what they were looking for at the Buddhist meditation center. They answered with the 1960'

s vernacular "a path man, we are seeking a path." Realizing that most of these young folks had been raised Christian, Father Keating would reply, "So why don't you search for a path within your own tradition?" To which they responded, "You mean Christianity has a path?" (Adapted from *Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening* by Cynthia Bourgeault)

During December, many of us are tempted again to see Christianity as a "destination" instead of a "path." We are tempted to replace the messy manger scene with a Norman Rockwell Christmas painting. As we endure long lines at the mall or the airport, we forget that the shepherds and wisemen traveled many miles with only the light of the stars to guide them. As much as we would like to "arrive" at the truth, both Paul and Jesus remind us that our faith is a "way." Such a way beckons you and I to keep thinking, praying, meditating, studying, listening, seeking, worshiping, forgiving, serving, and learning new ways to encounter the holy one.

The month of December will unfold with unexpected events. Pain and grief will envelop some of us as a spouse becomes seriously ill or a parent's death leaves an empty space at the Christmas dinner table. Joy and delight will surprise some of us as a new friendship blossoms or a new baby sits in Santa's lap for the first time. But both the sad and the elated will discover that Christmas remains empty if it is only a day that we work towards. Christmas, like Christianity, is a path. On such a path, the shepherds heard angels singing in the night, a young mother named Mary pondered in her heart, and some kings traveled the world to deliver extravagant gifts.

reflections

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The Secret

The past three summers have given members of our congregation the opportunity to serve in community for a week on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation in South Dakota. I welcome the time we have with the Lakota community and yet am often quite overwhelmed by it all. I find on mission trips there are so many experiences that I cannot take them all in and fully process the encounters within the context of the trip—I carry them tucked in my heart and mind and find these moving experiences emerge throughout the year.

One element that has run through all three summers of experiences on the family mission trip is the profound and deep sincerity of thankfulness the Lakota elders emanate in each encounter. Examining the living conditions and the daily situations of the tribe members makes it even more moving. So many components of our daily lives—having adequate transportation, decent housing and means to thrive—are not taken for granted within this Native American community. And yet at the core of their being is an appreciation and gratitude of life that many of us rarely, if ever experience. It is not that they are detached from the luxuries or pleasures of American life but it appears they live knowing there is so much more. Perhaps this intense focus emerges in knowing the very survival of their way of life and future generations is always tenuous. Or maybe with such a history of hardships there is a learned tempering of expectations. But I think is it more than that...

I have always had trouble putting into words what I learn from the Lakota way until I recently came across a wonderful children's book, *The Secret of Saying Thanks* by Douglas Wood. It takes children through a range of experiences within daily life, exploring what secrets we might know and where we might encounter those secrets. The book builds to the conclusion of the secret the author wants to share:

The heart that gives thanks is a happy one, for we cannot feel thankful and unhappy at the same time The more we say thanks, the more we find to be thankful for And the more we find to be thankful for, the happier we become. We don't give thanks because we are happy.

We are happy because we give thanks.

As we have just celebrated the American version of Thanksgiving these words about thankfulness and happiness which have been brought to life for me by the Lakota people of the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation are living in my heart. May we all seek to discover how happiness and thankfulness are intertwined in our lives.
