
## Christmas Offering Focuses on Self Sufficiency

## The Adventures of Advent

I have a secret for you. Ministers and musicians do not always get excited about Advent and Christmas.

This malady may begin when men and women are studying for the ministry in seminary. I remember a seminary intern who was dismayed. She said, "It never even occurred to me that we would lose Christmas to the church." I don't think she realized the irony of that statement.

Sometimes this dismay turns into a problematic approach to ministry. I knew a minister who decided to quit working on Christmas Eve, period. He told his church one Sunday: "You all get to enjoy the holiday while I have to work. I'm done with it. That is not fair." Needless to say his church was not happy about his decision.

I have a minister friend in another church who decided to give in to the comments in his congregation about not singing enough Christmas carols. You know what happened don't you? Others complained about singing TOO MANY Christmas carols! He was tempted to stand up on Christmas Eve and proclaim "Bah Humbug" and sit down.

I think Ebenezer Scrooge may have been a former minister.

So maybe you'll understand why every July when David Diebold and I sit down to work on the December preaching and worship schedule one of us asks, "Are we doing Christmas, AGAIN?"

But that is the beauty of the season. Our bah humbug approach IS the reason we need to repeat the sounding joy, to sing the carols, to light the candles, to retell the story of Joseph and Mary. By telling the tale again we remind ourselves of what matters most. We focus again on this child born in a manger, "God incarnate" as theologians say, in order to be clear about God's love for all and God's desire to be known by all.

See, here's the thing: no matter how jaded I think I have become, no matter how often I think there is NO WAY that Christmas is going to move me this year, something happens. The music sounds just the right chord or the scripture comes alive or an old friend sends a note of encouragement on a Christmas card and before I know it there are tears in my eyes reflecting the joy of Christmas.

I'll look forward to seeing you during the adventure of Advent on our way to Christmas.

## Tax-Free Contributions

Thanksgiving is this week, which means Christmas is just around the corner. As the accountant at Country Club Christian Church, my thoughts don't turn to Santa Claus or sugar plums. My thoughts turn to tax-free IRA contributions, stock gifts, and year-end giving.

Now is the perfect time to catch up on your pledge or contributions and make a gift that will be tax deductible in 2009. You may give gifts of cash, appreciated stock, or for those over 70½, a tax-free distribution from an IRA. Gifts of appre-

ciated stock are a win-win situation for you and the church. If the stock has increased in value, you can transfer it to the church and pay no capital gains tax. You receive a charitable tax deduction for the value of the stock on the day it is transferred to the church.

For those age 70½ or older, the Pension Protection Act allows you to make distributions from an IRA directly to your favorite charities, including our congregation. This distribution can be counted against your required minimum distribution if you choose; it will not be counted as a taxable distribution to you; and you are allowed to make distributions to charity of up to \$100,000 in any given year. In some states, making your charitable gifts through your IRA will save you state taxes, since this income will not be included in your Adjusted Gross Income. You might consider fulfilling your normal support of our operating budget with a gift from your IRA, or use this opportunity to stretch your gift for an "over and above" operating gift.

Another option for making a gift to the church is by using your credit card or with an automatic withdrawal from a checking account. A growing number of members have chosen one of these convenient ways to make a monthly gift to the church.

## Vanderbilt Ministerial Residency Being Considered

Country Club Christian Church has been invited to participate in a ministerial residency program sponsored by the Disciples Divinity House at Vanderbilt Divinity School. A grant from the Eli Lilly Foundation helped to create the innovative residency program at Vanderbilt, which aims to provide new graduates with a foundational learning experience in a Disciples congregation.

The residency program, called the "Congregational Immersion Project," is part of a larger initiative of the Lilly Foundation which focuses on transition into ministry from the academic experience and helping the church form strong congregational leaders. Two candidates are selected each year and after interviewing with congregations that are approved by the program, a mutually agreeable residency is formed for two years.

The Personnel Committee has accepted Vanderbilt's offer to explore the residency program and will begin considering candidates in 2010. The church's Endowment trustees have affirmed the possibility of partnering in the Congregational Immersion Project.

"We are not home right now, leave a message and we'll call back. And have a blessed day." This is the voicemail message of a friend of mine and whenever I hear it, it stays with me. Have a blessed day – what does that mean? Does it mean if my day does not go well, or I run into challenges in the day, that it is not blessed? Should I be more alert looking for the blessing of the day? Or do I go out and make it happen?

I know, I know – my friend is simply seeking to spread a positive message, offering a kind of gift to

those who call. But in this month that boasts communal opportunities to acknowledge blessings and to praise God, I find myself pondering all this can mean.
