Hope and Leadership

I picked up a book on leadership, titled *Unleashing the Power of Rubber Bands: Lessons in Non-Linear Leadership* by Nancy Ortberg. I bought it because Nancy's husband, John, is one of my favorite authors. I'm glad I did.

She links hope and leadership as two very important factors in moving any organization forward. She writes, "Leadership is the hope that we can change the things that need to be changed and create what we cannot imagine. Hope gives us the power to move forward, the

power to forgive, and the grace to keep the promises we have made."

I like that idea a lot. I've always been a hope-filled person. Every year, for example, I block out Dec. 31-Jan. 2 for a possible trip to Pasadena to see my beloved University of California Golden Bears play in the Rose Bowl. The fact that they have not been there since 1959 does not deter my hope! (My friend Greg Bates would tell me I'm delusional, not hopeful, but he is a Mizzou fan so what does he know?)

Ortberg thinks there are many people in our congregations who are filled with hope. She points out that they are all ages. "Too often, I think, we unfairly stereotype the elderly. We accuse them of being resistant to change and stuck in the old ways. But here's what I think. I think people who resist change and hold on to the old ways when they are in their twenties become people who resist change and hold on to old ways when they are older. People who embrace change and gravitate toward new ideas in their twenties become people who embrace change and gravitate toward new ideas when they are older."

I remember a man named Gordon Dalrymple. Gordon was an elder and a member of the board at the church I served in Atlanta. One night at a church board meeting, as we argued over the appropriate next steps for some project, Gordon stood in the middle of our meeting and said, "I have great hope for the ministry of this church. Let's not get stuck in minutiae when the Spirit of God is leading us toward new opportunities for ministry." It was like a voice right out of heaven. Gordon was 70-something at the time.

Gordon's advice reminds us of the new opportunities God is placing before us here at this great old church as we seek to become God's church. There is great wisdom and hope in our leadership here. I'm eagerly anticipating this new year more than any other!

Used Up Candles

Only three of the five candles made it to Christmas Day, as my son said we "used up" the other two. Actually, this was something to be proud of because it meant we lit and celebrated the coming of the Christ child through the use of our family Advent wreath more than occasionally throughout the season. It was a joy to spend numerous evenings at the dinner table during the four weeks of Advent with the glow of flames reflecting in the window. It helped center us. It helped me be in the moment with my two boys as I helped them light the purple and pink can-

dles. It spurred conversation about how the church marks the time as we prepare to celebrate the mystery of Christmas. Tangible rituals children can participate in give them handholds to make sense of this season in the context of their lives. Familiar rituals around holidays provide comfort and security – a touch of predictability. There are a range of practices families make time for in their lives and in doing so this teaches their children what they value.

One of the areas the Ministry to Children and Families seeks to focus on is helping families develop faith rituals or practices to enrich their faithfulness to God. As I took pleasure in sharing the ritual of lighting the Advent wreath and reading Advent devotions with my family, I also took great joy in knowing our church seeks to support families in developing their own family-based faith practices. Over the past three years at an event called Advent in Advance, we have given more than 60 families their own Advent wreath and candles and information about how to incorporate this practice into their celebrations of the season. We provide devotional materials that help the children come to know the story of God's love coming to us in the form of an infant. In the midst of placing the sticker on the Bethlehem scene the children are gaining foundations of our Christian heritage. With each practice we provide the opportunity for children to practice their faithfulness to God.

The family and home are essential in helping children (and adults) grow in their understanding and experience of the Holy One. What limited time we all spend within the church walls on Sunday gives us the community experience of worshiping and coming to know God, and carrying that into our daily lives through faith-based rituals is essential. Supporting families with tools and resources to claim their own home-based faith practices is a wonderful gift our congregation gives. So take heart, within our congregation there were many candles being "used up" during this Advent season!

Unimaginable Love

On a snowy Sunday morning at St. Luke's Hospital, I cradled him in my arms for the first time, about 7 and ½ pounds. Within weeks he was 13 pounds. It seems like I blinked and now today he turns 13 years old.

I thought I would teach him about the world and pass on the faith to him. But already he knows so much more than I do (especially about electronics, music and all other things cool). And watching him grow has renewed my faith and deepened my awareness of divine love.

When I first held him I made all sorts of promises. Over the years, I've broken them all. At first I thought I could protect him from all harm and I imagined that if I could master parenting, all would be ok. But now I realize that no matter what I do, it will not be enough. In order to thrive he needs other adults who care about him: Steve who served as his faith mentor, Mary the neighbor who pays him to care for her dogs, Peter who told him to use good table manners, Alex the babysitter from Bulgaria who taught him computer skills, Mrs. Pearson who inspired him academically, Mr. Ray who engages him in critical thinking.

Maybe the miracle of our faith is that each of us has the capacity to give birth to some unimaginable love. Maybe the miracle is that we cannot do it alone. Every week I come back to church, because I want to believe that God can still do something new with me. And every week I leave awed by the gathered folks who sustain me, my family, my fragile faith. The baby born in a stable reminds us that our lives are woven together so that the holy one of heaven can live among us. God is not an abstract idea or a winged creature floating above. God is that strength that we discover in community, that humility revealed to us when we try to love, that commitment we keep making to let our lives be filled with a holy joy.
