# Rich Toward God

Have you heard the story of a man who is dying at home in bed? He could smell the aroma of chocolate chip cookies – his favorite – baking in the kitchen. He was on his death bed but he wanted just one more cookie before he died. He crawled out of bed, slowly made his way down the stairs, shuffled over to the counter where the cookies were cooling, reached out to take one final cookie, when he felt a slap on his hand.

“Put that back,” his wife said, “they’re for the funeral!”

I guess everyone wants to have their cookies and eat them too. But sometimes we get stuck working so hard to get more and more cookies that we forget to stop and enjoy them. We say, “as soon as I make enough, I’ll relax and have one.” We think we can build a bigger cookie jar and save them all up for that day that is labeled “as soon as” but before you know it, our lives are as stale as the stored up cookies that we never have the time to enjoy.

How do we keep our lives fresh and alive? Jesus instructs his followers to be “rich toward God.” How does that happen? It begins with love. It starts with the realization that the gift of love is one that can never be taken away.

“Mama, don’t put that on Facebook,” my daughter says to me when I laugh at something funny she’s just said. Most of the time I honor this request, but occasionally I can’t resist sharing a cute photo or comment with my nearly 400 Facebook “friends.”

Do most of these folks –a mix of former classmates and coworkers, college friends and family – care about the mundane details of my life? Probably not. But I find that I do enjoy following what my Facebook friends are reading and doing, where they’re eating out and going on vacation.

Facebook has become so ubiquitous that even businesses, publications, and books have a presence on social media’s resident kingpin. By “liking” selected profiles, I keep up with the Brookside Farmer’s Market, Shatto Milk Company, and other individuals, causes and companies that interest me.

## Playing the Helzberg Organ

This past weekend, the public was treated to a great recital inaugurating the new organ at Helzberg Hall downtown. By that time, the posters were up in our building about the benefit program I am doing there in April. Many of you have already asked about the Apr. 24 event, what I am playing, and what it feels like to finally be able to play that magnificent instrument.

Well, obviously, it is a thrill and an honor to be the second public use of the instrument. I have heard the organ being tested several times when I have been in the hall for symphony rehearsals, but Saturday night was the first time I heard it fully used. What a phenomenal sound!

As you have probably gleaned from articles in this issue, the worship bulletin and elsewhere, Charles Miller, Minister for Music at National City Christian Church in Washington, DC, will split a program on the Helzberg organ as a benefit to repair earthquake damage to National City's structure and interior. We have carefully chosen literature that will not only showcase the organ, but will be audience friendly and not overly heavy.

My choices of literature begin with the work of two Kansas City composers: our own Dale Ramsey and Rick Deasley. Dale's "Sortie," composed at the time of his retirement, is a fiery toccata that will demonstrate the beautiful full sounds of the organ. Deasley's "Suite for Worship" is a collection of five short pieces that will utilize many of the softer sounds, as well as some louder ones. In addition, I am playing the first movement of Bach's "Sonata V." It is a bright, sparkling piece that dances all over the organ. Finally, I will end with a set of variations on a Pentecost hymn, "Veni Creator" by Maurice Duruflé. This work begins with a hymn-like registration and through the next three variations uses some of the more interesting, softer sounds of the organ. The work closes with a rousing toccata that is flashy and brilliant in sound, culminating with full organ.

I hope that you can work the evening into your schedules. Tickets will be on sale in the Parlor on Sundays, Mar. 18 and 25 at the cost of \$15.00 each.
